Rejoice (11.7-10)


- The Preacher commends the enjoyment of life under the sun, though the days of darkness (death are many)
- The Preacher commends rejoicing- by pursuing the ways of the eyes and heart, removing vexation and putting away pain
- Youth and vitality are fleeting

Remember (12.1-8)

- Remember the Creator (v.1) and know that your spirit returns to God who gave it (v.7) bookend the passage. This recognition of something beyond just what the preacher can observe.
- Three before passages
- Before the evil days of aging
- Before the failing of the created order (eschatological) and the explanation of aging
- Before the end of life

Discussion Questions

Feel free to choose what questions will be most helpful to your group to grow in their understanding of the Scripture and faithfully apply it to their lives.

Read Ecclesiastes 11:7-12:8

- 1. What is it that the Preacher is instructing us to do in this passage? How would you summarize it?
- 2. Pastor Mike described the Preacher's main ideas as enjoy the light while you have it because darkness is coming. In other words, the Preacher sees our existence as basically one of moving from light (youth) to darkness (death).
 - a. In Col 1:10-13 the Apostle Paul describes our situation using light and darkness metaphor as well. How would you describe his point?
 - b. How does the idea that you and those around you are essentially immortal beings (e.g. you will continue to exist into eternity in one form or another), and that we are all on a trajectory towards either inconceivable beauty and glory or incomprehensible corruption and suffering shape the way you view yourself and your life? How should it?
 - c. How does it affect the way that you view others? How should it affect it?
- 3. So for the Preacher, who is focused on physical and temporal life (life under the sun), we basically move from light to darkness. But for the Apostle Paul—who is focused on eternal life in Christ—those who are in Christ move from darkness to light.

- a. Which approach or perspective do you tend to have: do you tend to focus on the deterioration or flourishing of your physical/temporal life or your eternal life? Why is that?
- 4. What does it look like, practically speaking, to be focused on the reality of eternal life without being irresponsible or neglecting the essential aspects of your temporal existence on earth? In other words, how do you still work a job, develop a career, love your spouse, raise kids, develop friendships, have fun, etc. all with a focus on eternity?
- 5. Consider where you spend your time and energy. Where are you currently living for eternity, and where are you stuck pursuing temporal things that will pass away?
 - a. Where is God calling you to be more intentional and faithful about pursuing eternal matters and what would that look like?
